# **Chapel Rooted** in History

The chapel of Our Lady Rosa Mystica is now centrally located in the school lobby, easily accessible to visitors, and can seat up to 50 people. While the chapel construction is new, there are pieces of history rooted in its tradition:

- The crucifix and statues were relocated from the previous chapel location.
- The tabernacle was donated by St. Mary's church no one knows where it was originally from – but it was in storage and beautifully restored for our new chapel.
- The stations of the cross were in the original 1924 St. Joseph Chapel in Saginaw, PA whose congregation was moved to York Haven and became Holy Infant in 1949. Then in the late '70s the stations were replaced and these stations were donated to Cristo Salvador Church where they were repainted with Spanish lettering and were used until the 1995 merging of Christo Salvador and St. Mary's, where they were placed in storage and subsequently donated to YC.
- The stained glass in the wall looking into the lobby is from the previous YC chapel location, and the new stained glass by the altar was created to match the old.
- The chalice used in the chapel and for all school Masses was a gift from the family of Michael Cawley, a New York firefighter who died at the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001.



# Tony Zorbaugh '94, Faith and Community Leader

## "If you give a man a fish, you feed him for a day. If you teach a man to fish, you feed him for a lifetime."

Tony Zorbaugh '94 is the Executive Director of a non-profit, The Source (iamthesource.org), a Christian Ministry outreach center for the poor and the homeless in Vero Beach, FL.

Tony cares and feeds the homeless with his restaurant-style dining... seven days a week. He established a myriad of programs and services to accommodate their daily needs beginning with Dining with Dignity, a 3-month training program that teaches culinary and food service skills to needy men and women. Graduates of the program establish long-term sustainability while emotionally and spiritually empowering themselves. The Source also operates two Dignity Food Trucks through Dignity Foods, an extension to the training program, offering the ability to learn social skills in preparation of employment in the food industry.

Dignity Smiles was created for graduates needing dental restoration. Dignity Catering and Dignity Desserts are two additions of the Dignity programs which provides catering for local events. Dignity Income Opportunities provide jobs for Source clients assembling products for a charter flight company. Dignity Bus, the country's first overnight secured emergency shelter on wheels provides 20 sleeping pods, 4 pet pods, 2 bathrooms and storage. Tony is currently working on a trademark patent for the program so other cities may embark on a similar project. Dignity Village, a private community for work, prayer, programs and services, as well as affordable tiny homes on the acreage, is currently in the planning stages. He has traveled to other cities throughout the country speaking on all the programs he has developed for The Source.

Tony's prior 12-year work experience at York County Youth Development Center, where he founded the Community Outreach Program, has helped to give him the skills to do his life's work. His foundations of work, ethics and faith began at York Catholic and St. Mary's Church, where he met his wife Ana. His faith was deepened when he lost both his parents in a house fire in York in 2015. When I asked Tony who he was, he said, "I am a husband, father, employer, but mainly I am the Son of the Living King, Jesus Christ. All the other titles can be taken away from me... but nothing can take me away from Him."

# **Expanded Educational Opportunities at York Catholic**

York Catholic is a school of five hundred fifty students, grades 7-12, and they come to us with a wide array of interests and talents. We continue to look for new ways to better educate our students, taking into account their personal strengths and attributes, and we recognize the need to pursue opportunities that afford York Catholic students choice, exposure, and educational experiences beyond our doors. The following four programs do just that.

York Catholic students have the option to pursue online study through VHS, the **Virtual High School**. VHS offers students a variety of courses not found in our course catalog, and offers specialized study in any discipline from Astronomy to the Stock Market to Sports Medicine. Students grades 9-12 can opt to take a semester long course online, choosing from an extensive course listing. Popular online course titles include Principles of Engineering, Cyber Security, Forensic Science, Latin, and American Sign Language.

**College in the Classroom** is a well-established program at York Catholic that allows juniors and seniors the opportunity to earn college credit through Alvernia University in Reading, Pennsylvania. Students earn college credit at their desks

in York Catholic classrooms, taught by York Catholic faculty members. The total cost per course is \$240, and families cover the cost of these courses. At the end of senior year students request that an Alvernia transcript be sent to the school of their choice, and those college credits can be used to fulfill graduation requirements toward an undergraduate degree. The program is flourishing, and this year we have 69 students participating, with 147 courses in progress. Many students are taking more than one course; six seniors in the class of 2022 are currently earning 12 credits apiece from their desks right here at 601 East Springettsbury Avenue. Our College in the Classroom offerings for the 2021-2022 school year include the following:

- Sociology / Psychology
- Comprehensive Business Technology
- Statistics
- Spanish 5
- Journalism
- Music Theory

**Dual Enrollment** is a program that allows students to take collegiate level courses at Penn State York, York College,



and Harrisburg Area Community College at a discounted rate. Seniors are allowed to leave the YC campus and with preapproval take a college class with credits awarded both at the college or university and York Catholic. A senior could, for example, leave York Catholic after their sixth period lunch and

mother of Cassandra '18, Breanna '20, & Isabella '22 take a 1:30 PM class at HACC. The introduction to the collegiate classroom in 12th grade has obvious benefits and credits transfer. Students are encouraged to fulfill general education requirements this way, but are able to explore career possibilities on the introductory level as well.

A fourth educational opportunity is the FLEX program through **York** 

County School of Technology. This program is for juniors and seniors, and allows students to study at YC through the morning and attend a class of interest at York County School of Technology in the afternoon. Students are able to graduate with a York Catholic diploma and benefit from elective offerings at York Tech; five York Catholic students are enrolled in this program for the 2021-22 school year. Classes offered through the FLEX program include the following:

- Introduction to Automotive Technology
- Construction Technician
- Introduction to Welding
- Nail Technology

As we enter a new decade, we will maintain the tradition of academic excellence in our classrooms. We do, however, recognize the need to expand and explore options that provide our students with choice and career exploration, catering to personal aptitude and interest. # York Catholic Students Excel On Advanced Placement Exams



Current YC Students Named National AP Scholars: Mairin Landis, Timothy Ventura, Natalie Javitt

The scores of the national Advanced Placement (AP) exams for high school students are in and York Catholic students have again excelled.

Advanced Placement (AP) courses offer high school students college level rigor with AP students dedicating long hours of study that begin during the summer months and end in May with a national exam. AP courses are offered through College Board and are graded on a scale of 1-5 with one the lowest grade possible and five the highest grade possible. Many colleges and universities accept a score of three or higher for college credit, a motivating factor for the students enrolled.

York Catholic offers Advanced Placement courses in English, Language, Biology, Chemistry, Calculus, History, and 2D Art and Design. This spring 73 York Catholic students took the AP exams and achieved an 81% pass rate of a 3 or higher. Of the students who took the exams, 20% scored a 5, 20% scored a 4, and 41% scored a 3.

AP Scholars with Distinction are students who earn scores of 3 or higher on five or more AP exams. The following graduates from the class of 2021 have been recognized as an AP Scholar with Distinction: Gavin Bonner, Emilio Gurany, and Bernadette Schintz (daughter of Cathy Schintz '95).

AP Scholars are students who earn scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP exams. The following graduate from the class of 2021 has been recognized as an AP Scholar: Gina Bolli. The following current seniors have been recognized as AP Scholars: Natalie Javitt (daughter of Larry Javitt '80), Mairin Landis (daughter of Katie Skehan Landis '84), and Timothy Ventura.



John Weisser '23 has been a standout in his German class at York Catholic. As a sophomore, he earned a gold medal for his performance on the 2020 National German Level II Exam sponsored by The American Association of Teachers of German. Only 17 students in Central Pennsylvania achieved this distinction. John is putting his German language skills to practical use this school year as he has chosen to study his junior year abroad.

John is currently spending the academic year at the Friedrich Schiller Gymnasium in Marbach am Neckar. The town is located about 12 miles northwest of Stuttgart, Germany. This prestigious school is the largest in the state and second largest in the country. He notes that the approach to science and math is much more broad than in the United States, and that there is a heavier focus on philosophy, language, music, and art.

Beyond holding a full academic schedule, John has immersed himself in German life. He is living with host parents Jürgen and Elka Braun, and attends school with his host brother, Johannes. John spends his days biking or walking to school, participating in his classes, enjoying lunch in the local town, spending time with his new friends, and learning more about daily life in Germany. He has already participated in a class excursion to Berlin, Germany's capital city. While there, John explored many cultural, historical and religious landmarks. He also visited Germany's parliament building during the height of the German federal election season. Aside from touring

# **Alumni Pursue Religious Life**

York Catholic has been a foundation for many students to become inspired to pursue Catholic religious life. Keith Carroll '00 (son of Doris Freed Carroll '66 and Keith Carroll '66) and Dan Mitzel '72 are among many who followed the calling to the priesthood, while Pat Hinton '59 and Dominica LoBianco '62 not only became Sisters, but also returned to YC to teach. We had a chance to catch up with our 2 most recent graduates who answered the call to Sisterhood, Sister Alexandra Prosser '99 and Sister M. Isabella Erb (Rachel Erb) '07 (daughter of Amy Pasch Erb '81), to hear more about their inspiration and advice.

## Tell us about how your experience at York Catholic served as an inspiration to enter religious life.

**Sister Isabella:** I first started thinking about Religious Life when I was in 7th and 8th Grade at York Catholic. Through the witness of one of the Sisters in our school, Sister Marianne Lallone, IHM, the thought of belonging to Jesus and being a Sister in the future was stirred up in my heart. I remember watching Sister Marianne come to life with so much joy as she talked about Jesus and His love and goodness for us. I remember asking her one day, what it means to be a Sister, knowing that they, sisters, must pray but there must be

more to it than just praying. When she said, "To be a Sister means to be a bride of Christ" my heart was so filled with a joy that I had never felt before and the desire to belong all to Jesus and be His bride was always there in my heart. Through Sister Marianne's witness and her openness to share more about her Religious Life, I was able to grow in my faith. She encouraged me to spend time with Jesus and get to know Him more, to actually know Him and His Heart and love for me. I spent a lot of moments or visits in the chapel throughout the day at York Catholic and enjoyed going to daily Mass. Even though I found moments to pray, I still enjoyed doing normal things of a teenage girl; wearing jewelry, horseback riding, ballet, going to dances, hanging out with friends, etc.

**Sister Alexandra:** As a student at York Catholic, I was always proud of being part of our Catholic school spirit. In Religion classes, once each year, I remember having a priest and religious visit to tell us that we should consider a religious vocation and that, if God was calling us to this, it would be the way we would be most happy. Having this knowledge was important. I also remember being invited to daily morning Mass by one of the Sisters and while I did not attend in high school, the thought stayed with me such that I developed the practice on my own in college.

## What advice would you give to students to be open to a religious calling?

Sister Alexandra: In regards to being open to a religious calling, prayer is important. Being "available" to the Lord, speaking with Him in prayer, and asking for His will, whatever that might be - whether in a specific vocation, or choosing a college...or anything - really helps! It can also be a real gift to foster friendships where there is a mutual desire to enjoy life and to support each other in living a holy life. Many of our Sisters can say that the presence of Christ in the Eucharist, whether in Eucharistic Adoration or receiving the Blessed Sacrament more frequently, played a major role in their vocation. Mary is also a great help on the journey!

Sister Isabella: For those discerning their vocation, especially feeling a call to religious life or even those who might not know what vocation Jesus has given them. I would say pray every day for openness to the Holy Spirit. Start by getting to know Jesus, actually know Him as a real human person, PERSONALLY! Not just knowing of God, but who HE is, one who loves us as we are. One who sees what we will become with His grace if we are open. He is a God who fights for us, waits for us, sees every part of us. Start with being with Jesus who loves you and wants to hear your thoughts. He never rejects or finds our words too small or silly. He knows us more than we know ourselves

Discernment can be scary at first but Jesus takes our great acts of trust and transforms them into great beauty. I have learned that He will never disappoint and will always surprise with His goodness when we follow Him, even in the most difficult moments. When we think we have nothing to give or we do not know what to do next, He takes that act of trust with joy and carries us. So do not be afraid to ask Jesus what He wants of you and has created you to be! You were created for greatness. Our world is so much in need of light and the witness of courage, trust, and hope!

# Abe Amoros '85 - Serving the People & Expanding Equity

Abe Amoros was born in Jersey City, NJ and moved to Puerto Rico when he was six months old, where his father ended his formal education in the sixth grade. Along with his parents and brother, Abe came to York when he was 7 years old. His mother worked in the York City School district for 24 years. Education was always a priority

in his family, and after graduating from YC he went on to earn his BA in Journalism from Penn State University and his MA in Governmental Administration from the University of Pennsylvania. Not only has he been a private business owner of Amoros Communications, he has also had a stellar career in state and local government, including Director of Community Development, under York Mayor John Brenner, and Press Secretary for PA Governor Ed Rendell. Most recently in November of 2020, Abe was approved as Managing Director of the city of Reading, PA. Reading is the 4th largest city in PA, 69% of its population is Latino and particularly challenging because 35% of the residents live below the poverty level.

Abe told me he sees the access to education and job opportunities as one of the biggest problems in cities. Reading is fortunate to have good colleges or post-secondary schools such as Alvernia University, Albright College, and Penn State Berks, but admission and funding is still a problem for many. He said the rewards of city leadership are accomplishment for getting things done for individuals and groups, even small quality of life issues such as trash pickup. Earning the trust of constituents is another; people knowing they can count on you to follow up. One of the biggest drawbacks is that it is a "thankless job" and most times the only person he knows thanking him is Jesus. After more than 3 decades of serving people, Abe is an expert on human behavior as well!

In 2018, Abe was appointed to the Penn State Board of Trustees by Governor Tom Wolf. More recently, he is giving back in a different way – he and his wife Leslie just committed \$25,000 to the Penn State University Bellisario College of Communications to establish the Amoros Education Equity Scholarship. The gift will be matched 1:1 through the university's Equity Matching program. To date, the work that Abe is most proud of is founding the York City Little League, which has served more than 3,000 youth baseball players and continues today. His message for everyone he meets is, "Work hard, serve others, and be grateful."

## **York Catholic Fund**

Did You Know? York Catholic's annual operating budget is only partially covered by tuition. More specifically, the tuition that each family pays for their child to attend YC only covers 71% of the cost of that education. To help fund that "tuition gap," York Catholic relies heavily on gifts to our annual York Catholic Fund.
