Dear YC Family,

Happy Summer! I do hope this issue of *Greensleeves* is read while dipping your toes in the water or enjoying a fresh cup of coffee in the wilderness. Regardless of where you are while perusing these pages, there is much to enjoy and celebrate.

Notably, our Class of 2023 has made us proud. This is the class that has experienced the most change during their time with us. They began their time at YC in the un-air-conditioned classrooms of 1958 and are graduating from a \$12.5 million renovated facility, having benefited from a new spiritual life center and chapel, 43 renovated classrooms with air-conditioning, a new stadium with a turf field, and a new student center to include a state-of-the-art college and career readiness center with programs to match. In addition, they are the class that, due to the pandemic starting in March their freshman year, has experienced the most adversity in the world of education. In fact, this past senior year has been their only "normal" year since middle school and yet they have not missed a single lesson in their four years. We are proud of their accomplishments and what they will be doing for our community in their future endeavors.

In addition to celebrating the Class of 2023, I hope you enjoy updates about how our students are prepared for both their college and career goals as YC Moves Them Forward in all ways imaginable.

Finally, I am especially grateful to the York Excavating Company for their assistance in York Catholic's ability to preserve a staple figure from our greater York community. In April, a large crane arrived at our front entrance followed by a structure encased in wood. This structure can be recognized by all York Catholic family and friends as it is something we have all driven by on our way to campus. As a result of the sale of the Glen-Gery Brick property behind campus, all structures have been demolished, but there is one structure that deserved a relocation so it could be preserved for all time. I am pleased to share the Glen-Gery Good Shepherd brick and mason mural is now proudly displayed near the main entrance to the York Catholic Middle and High School. It only seemed fitting that those of

us who have had the pleasure of enjoying that image as part of our daily commute be able to continue to whisper the prayer that comes with it. As John wrote in Chapter 10, verse 11, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

May we always remember the Good Shepherd who has sacrificed so much to ensure we continue to have this thriving and vibrant community.

# **Middle States Visit**

As part of York Catholic's reaccreditation cycle, a visiting team from the Middle States Association Commission on Elementary and Secondary Schools spent three days at York Catholic in March. A Middle States visit is much like an audit, and the team spent time reviewing data and evidence collected in regard to building finance, facilities, health and safety, personnel, educational programming, student services, and student life.

The visiting team was led by Father Michael Tidd, OSB, a Benedictine monk and priest of St. Mary's Abbey in Morristown, New Jersey. He is also Headmaster of Delbarton School, a college preparatory school for boys. Father Tidd was joined by Mrs. Leslie Fundakowski, from Wilmington, Delaware. Mrs. Fundakowski spent the better part of her career as an educator and administrator at Padua Academy, a Catholic girls' school in Wilmington. The third visiting team member was Dr. Stefani Sobol-Pastor, Religion Department Chair at Seton-Lasalle Catholic High School in Pittsburgh.

When the team wasn't reviewing data, they were in our hallways and classrooms, talking with school faculty and staff, students, and parents as they assessed day-to-day management, long-term planning, and school culture.

In addition to reviewing what we have accomplished, the team also evaluates objectives we are working towards. Our Middle States protocol is called Excellence by Design, and it requires that we establish three measurable objectives to track and document over the next seven-year cycle, with positive results. Our objectives are as follows:

- The first objective focuses on Career Exploration and the development of a curriculum designed to better prepare our graduates for life after high school in regard to career choice, job satisfaction, and ultimately, success in the workplace.
- The second objective focuses on Business and Technology, and our need to update course offerings in order for our students to be competitive in those constantly changing career fields.
- The third objective is not academically driven, rather it targets our ongoing efforts to raise funds necessary for continued Building Renovations.

As a result of the March visit by the Middle States team, York Catholic has enthusiastically been recommended for reaccreditation through the year 2029.

# **Enthronement of the Sacred Heart**

York Catholic Chaplain, Father John Kuchinski, consecrated our school to Jesus through the Enthronement of the Sacred Heart. The Enthronement was divinely revealed to St. Margaret Mary along with 12 promises from Jesus to those who would respond to the pleadings of His Heart and make an effort to return His love. The Spiritual Life department and the student Peer Ministry Team participated in the para-liturgy



where Jesus was made King of our school and our hearts. Two beautiful images of the Sacred Heart were hung in the main lobbies of the high school and middle school as a physical representation of the consecration.

# **Family Customized Tuition**

Family Customized Tuition makes the York Catholic education experience we all know can be transformative, accessible to more families in our region. We are excited about the opportunities this milestone change represents for our school and for our ability to serve our families and communities.

Erin (Palmer) Langione '04 has taught at York Catholic for fifteen years, and currently teaches Health, Middle School Gym, and Child Development. Erin is also a moderator and instructor for the national educational platform, The Virtual High School (VHS). Many York Catholic students are enrolled in VHS online classes which provide the ability to study a plethora of courses that are content-specific, including American Sign Language, Nuclear Science, Business Law, Modern Middle East, Video Game Design, and Peacemaking.

Not only does Erin teach Health for The Virtual High School, she rewrote their national Health curriculum last summer. She applied for the position and was hired to develop a 15-week instructional plan for teachers using guidelines from the National and Connecticut Health Standards.

The course she wrote examines the emotional, social, and physical aspects of health and wellness. Emphasis is placed on healthy decision-making, understanding teen risk behaviors, and looking into the future to estimate one's quality of life. Students analyze healthy behaviors and develop a plan for the prevention of future health problems.

We greatly appreciate Erin's time and talent with VHS as her efforts there earn discounted seats for our students. Erin most appreciates that York Catholic students are able to discern a future career path through online study. Some find confirmation of an interest while taking an online course, and some discover that an area of interest might not be right after all. # Capital Campaign Transformative for YC

The Oxford Dictionary describes "Transformation" as "A thorough or dramatic change in form or appearance." Some might challenge whether or not "Transformation" is a strong enough description for what's taken place here at York Catholic over the past five years. Through the unyielding generosity of many benefactors, York Catholic Middle and High School has successfully navigated through two phases of a capital campaign, and the results are astounding.

The list of successful projects resulting from Phase One are too many to catalog, but some of the highlights include: Science Lab upgrades, renovated classrooms, renovation and relocation of the Chapel, facility-wide safety enhancements, Student Center and Lobby upgrades, a new Student and Media Center, a new College and Career Center, and an artificial turf field at the stadium.

Phase Two resulted in a complete renovation of the former Brady Science Hall from roof to restrooms, including 19 air-conditioned classrooms. New bleachers to seat 1,000 fans and a new press box were added to the stadium complex. The first step of our Grotto and Rosary Walk relocation and construction began this spring when the Good Shepherd brick and mason mural that used to be featured at the entrance of Glen-Gery Brick on Boundary Avenue found a new home at York Catholic as a welcoming feature to the new Grotto area. The remainder of the Grotto project will take place next summer.

All in all, we have happy students and happy teachers who are utilizing the many new advantages presented to them in this transformation.

None of these enhancements would've been possible without the York Catholic family, its friends, and businesses sharing their blessings with us and we are forever grateful.



The York Catholic Grotto and Rosary Walk is designed as an outdoor sanctuary to provide a prayerful oasis for our students, alumni, and community as well as a preservation of green space to promote spiritual, physical, and mental health.

Parents and business owners, would you like to save on your State Income Tax return? Additionally, what if we told you those savings can have a direct impact on York Catholic students? Sounds too good to be true, doesn't it? It's not, and it's been making a dramatic impact on the bottom line at York Catholic.

Businesses can file for either the Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) or the Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit (OSTC). Both of these programs can be applied for through the State Department of Community and Economic Development. Eligible companies receive a 90% dollar-for-dollar reduction in state tax liability, and those tax credits can be dedicated to York Catholic Middle and High School.

These funds are deposited into the Neumann Scholarship Fund at the Diocese of Harrisburg and are awarded in tuition assistance to Pennsylvania students who demonstrate need through filling out the financial aid form through Simple Tuition Solutions.

Individuals can enjoy similar tax savings through the Special Purpose Entity (SPE) program. SPE allows Pennsylvania individuals to redirect 90% of their personal state income taxes to York Catholic. SPE is based on tax liability, not income, therefore each taxpayer's situation will differ. Participants must be PA residents where at least one spouse is employed or has an ownership interest in a PA for-profit business. An individual or couple filing jointly must have a state tax liability of \$3,500 or more to participate. To see if you may qualify, you can find your PA tax liability on Form PA-40 Line 12 of your most recent tax return. 100% of participant contributions are distributed to the school. The money you redirect to York Catholic is for educational purposes, specifically tuition assistance.


Students who are accepted into the program are expected to participate in various admissions events through the academic year including, but not limited to open houses, futures nights, and shadow days.

# Forge-ing a Collaboration

It started with one question. I asked Ms. Valerie Long from the York County History Center what materials she had available to help my students understand the historical context of the book, *Forge*. Ms. Long told me about her American Revolution "artifakes" trunk and we worked together comparing the items mentioned in the book to the items she had on hand.

After her visit at York Catholic, I asked if she wanted to help me with an idea to build a museum-style exhibition. I was allowing the students to either take the historical information from Valley Forge or allowing the students to use the book, Forge, as a jumping point to build a project that would showcase their talents and interests. I wanted to show the students their projects could have real world applications and they should think of what they create as part of the bigger discussion of history and literature.

Ms. Long said she would be happy to help us and if we wanted, she would showcase the projects at the York County History Center just in time for their winter membership event and the anniversary of Valley Forge.

It was an offer I jumped on. Soon the clay and creativity were flying and the students were taking ownership of their projects knowing they would be on display at the York County History Center. Some students even took on the role as project managers to ensure the projects would be completed on time for the event.

It was a week in which we learned the process of working together, building historical artifacts, dioramas, and learning the power of asking just one question.







# "All the World's a Stage." - HAMLET

Teaching Shakespeare generally involves a dull plodding of students towards the finish line of the play, with a teacher desperately trying to inspire them to make it through.


This was not the case with the Class of 2023. When I taught 30 of them in their sophomore year, they devoted themselves to Macbeth with uncommon vigor. While generally I vary the roles every day to give all students equal opportunities to practice their Shakespearean declamation, this group made it difficult. Justin Melhorn as Macbeth was unparalleled, so I kept him locked in the lead as often as possible. Whereas the average group of students is lucky to boast a single girl who can handle Lady Macbeth's haunting guilt, in this group there were so many talented actresses that I wanted to see them all wring their hands.

So when I heard four YC seniors—Justin Melhorn, Sophie Fraser, Maggie Motter, and Luis Nguyen—were cast in a production of *Hamlet* in the fall of 2022, I was thrilled.

For Sophie, who has been involved with community theater since kindergarten, being cast as Ophelia checked off a role on her acting bucket list. She loved the role not only because Ophelia is a quintessential character, but also because "it's fun to play crazy." In her portrayal of Ophelia, though, Sophie hoped to show how "she's a girl who gets absolutely crushed by the men in her life," and she has profound "humanity, even when she's going insane."

Sophie orchestrated the YC takeover of the Orange Mite production; she needed "three unsuspecting, friendly, loyal people to be coerced into auditioning" so she'd have people her age in the show. This was central to the director's vision of the play: Sophie recalls that he wanted it to be "a passionately teenage experience because Hamlet is a student who comes home from school and finds himself facing more pressure than he'd ever imagined, and it shows the human experience of trauma from a young perspective."

Justin brought that youthful expression out of the character, but he also balanced Hamlet's pendulum of vengeful pensiveness and pretend insanity. And while he felt immense "pressure to do the role justice," that didn't stop him from





having a great time, particularly when learning stage combat and sword fighting. The experience also expanded his acting abilities, as he was pushed to improv and to find a character within himself, rather than using an accent.

But one of the biggest takeaways is how much better they understand Shakespeare's language now. As Sophie put it, "You reach a point where your brain starts to think in iambic pentameter."

Maggie and Luis, who were cast as Hamlet's duplicitous schoolmates, Rosencrantz and Guildenstern, were nervous to audition but felt "proud and honored" to be cast in larger roles—they'd gone in expecting to have one or two lines each and instead found themselves at many more rehearsals.

For Luis, joining community theater was never about the acting; rather, he was in it for the memories he could make with his friends. Yet he experienced a novel phenomenon during the process, noting, "It was the first time adults were peers for me." Seeing people twice his age receive the same direction and feedback was "strange, but encouraging," especially as "we're about to graduate and go be adults." "It was good practice," he added. Maggie agreed, as "getting to joke around with the grown-ups" was enlightening.

Despite the long hours, the arduous practices, and the frustration of Early Modern English, all four agreed they don't regret their experiences.

More than twenty years ago, I read Hamlet for the first time; it has been my favorite Shakespearean work ever since, and I had never seen it performed to my liking until our YC students brought it to life. To Justin, Sophie, Maggie, and Luis-thank you for your work to translate the linguistic beauty of the 1600s to the modern context. Your talents are unparalleled, and you represent the best of York Catholic, both on and off the stage.

# **Continuing a Cultural Tradition**

Every school year there's a gem of a story that lands in our lap when we least expect it. In previous issues, we shared Meredith Doores '27 story about performing with gymnast Simone Biles and Cydney Roberts '26 competing in an international tennis tournament in Barbados. Ever humble, both of these students' accomplishments were discovered only when they requested to be excused from school to participate. This year was no exception. Will Hinkson '23 missed a half day of school to perform in a drumming exhibition. But wait, Will plays on the football team; he's not in the band...or so we thought. We were stunned to hear Will's explanation and asked him to share his story:

I am William Montgomery Hinkson IV. I am a fourth generation with no biological ancestry. I take pride in the confusion on a person's face when I show up as an Asian guy with an American name. I was adopted from China at two years of age and my given name by the orphanage is Dang Xiao Zheng.

Since seven-years-old, I have been a student at the Chinese Cultural and Arts Institute in Harrisburg. I train and perform Traditional Chinese Drumming, and this is a way to keep me connected with my heritage. Chinese War Drums were used on the battlefield to direct and encourage the soldiers. Different beats guided the soldiers into different formations, with one rhythm for "attack" and another for "retreat." Although drumming is no longer a tool for war, we continue with the rhythm and dynamics during performances.

We are often invited to perform throughout the year at community cultural festivals, educational events, and non-profit charity fundraising events throughout Pennsylvania, Maryland, New York, New Jersey, and Washington DC. In addition, I am invited to contribute volunteer service hours for the Formosa Association of Student Cultural Ambassadors (FASCA) sponsored by the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in New York and participate as a youth mentor for international students in New York, New Jersey, and Washington, DC.

Congratulations to Will for this outstanding achievement that not only preserves an element of his culture, but entertains audiences while sharing traditions.





When I talked with this alumnus, he was taking in the sites of one of the most breathtaking places in Canada – Banff National Park. Kevin travels the world as the "front of the house" Production Designer and Lighting Director for the country music band, Old Dominion. Old Dominion has won Academy of Country Music's Group of the Year award for the last 5 years! The band's touring requires about 150 days a year of travel and when Kevin is at home in Nashville he is designing and working on other shows as a freelancer.

Kevin is the son of former social studies teacher Pat Lichty, and younger brother to sisters Kerry '02 and Claire '05. It was in 8th grade when Kevin first started working backstage for York Catholic musicals and senior plays. He worked side-by-side with his dad, Tom, a devoted volunteer who spent countless hours at YC designing and building stage sets. He was also inspired by YC stage crew director Barb Nealon, who retired this year. Junior year of high school he realized this creative passion could be parlayed into a career so he decided to pursue a degree in production design in college. It wasn't until he went to college at Clarion that he found out college production sets were produced by professionals. It was such a contrast from his experience

in high school with Mrs. Nealon. "She let us students do it all," he remembers. His first job during college was at SeaWorld in Florida, then he went on to opportunities at a Shakespeare theater in Washington DC, Premier Productions in Harrisburg, and eventually landed a job for 6 years at Morris Light & Sound in Nashville. Kevin was touring with Kenny Chesney and Old Dominion was the opening act. The next year OD reached out to him to join them thinking he would be a good fit with their band.

I asked Kevin to share a memorable experience about his time on the road. His answer gave me much insight into his character. "It's never about the famous people; it's always about the amazing places I've gotten to experience. I've been to most of the US national parks, Europe, Australia, and even Fiji!" He continues to give back to his alma mater, adding his expertise to YC musicals and plays; most recently helping out for 3 days on the set of this year's production of *Matilda: The Musical*. He feels lucky to be part of this "company," the 5 "CEO" band members are great people and he's going to enjoy this experience as long as he can!

# **Now Hear This!**

Nick Gingerich '18 is living his dream as a sound engineer in the entertainment industry. He is currently employed by Maryland Sound International and travels the East Coast setting up microphones, speakers, amplifiers, and sound boards for concerts and shows for entertainers such as Cyndi Lauper, Annie Lennox, James Taylor, Graham Nash, and Joni Mitchell. He also was involved in setting up the sound for all of the visitors to be able to hear the energetic New Year's Eve celebration at Times Square in New York City.

Nick credits Mrs. Barbara Nealon and his involvement with York Catholic stage crew during his time at YC that sparked his interest in sound engineering. His participation in all of the music programs at YC and the encouragement of Ms. Cecelia Mezza helped him to have a leg up to understand the musical language to support his technical knowledge.

He was the sound engineer and designer for the marching band of his alma mater, Towson University, and was responsible for trouble-shooting on the spot to ensure the flutes could be heard as easily as the trumpets. His technical expertise was honed with the band while his customer service side was groomed during his work with the university's Event & Conference Services department.

When he graduated from Towson and his full time job took him away from his work with the university band, it was Nick who suggested to the dean to use students as sound engineers as part of the Towson internship program. This would allow the college students to gain valuable experience ahead of their competition for employment.

Nick works predominantly in Washington DC, Maryland, and New York, but also travels to other areas for additional opportunities. When not on site, he's back at headquarters preparing for the next show, designing layouts, or repairing and maintaining equipment.

On a day away from the job, Nick stopped by York Catholic to talk to current students about a career in the audio industry and to lend a hand to a class project focusing on music recording. The students had a chance

York Catholic thanks Nick for giving back to his high school alma mater and for demonstrating that YC Moves Me Forward is not just a slogan, but a way of life.


# CONGRATS CLASS OF

We all may have passed the finish line at York Catholic, but our journey is far from over. We have so




