We looked at what they had to offer online, talked with founder Laura Tierney, and knew very quickly that this would be an invaluable educational partnership. We were hooked.

York Catholic has partnered with The Social Institute since August, providing students and parents a resource to help navigate the pressures and influences of social media today alongside the ever-present impact of the cell phone. The Social Institute is a leading educational platform, equipping families with the skills necessary to manage today's social arena, in the classroom and beyond, online and offline, in healthy, high character ways.

York Catholic is featuring monthly lessons to grades 7, 8, and 9, incorporating timely trending topics from social

media and tech use to current events impacting student well being and learning. The Social Institute also offers Family Huddle for parents, a resource designed to help to keep parents current with apps and trends.



Family Huddle offers conversation starters for parents who are struggling to break through the silence of the screen at home, providing a jumping in point for difficult conversations.

Parenting and adolescence have never been so challenging, and we are hopeful that this new partnership with The Social Institute will provide tips, tools, and strategies to help open the lines of communication at home, and enable families to take control over the devices and apps that so heavily influence impressionable young teens. He was chosen UPI Lineman of the year and was sixth in the Heisman Trophy balloting his senior year. He was the #1 draft choice of the Green Bay Packers and played eleven years in the NFL – seven with Green Bay, two with the Oakland Raiders, and two with the New York Giants.

Mike's passion is empowering youth and helping them develop a larger vision for their lives. He delivered a message of hope and encouragement to help students overcome challenges, deal with peer pressure, and develop the self-confidence

Milner Sosa: Dedicated Service

York Catholic's Middle School Spanish teacher Milner Sosa was honored for his 20 years of service to Catholic education at the Diocese of Harrisburg's Educational Conference in September. In addition to introducing Spanish language to YC's 7th and 8th grade students, Señor Sosa has also served as soccer coach to the Fighting Irish boys' varsity and girls' middle school teams. Señor was a soccer star in his native Paraguay and travels home every year with volunteers from the non-profit organization he and his wife Eileen started.

OutreachPARAGUAY provides meaningful outreach to resource-poor communities in Paraguay and assists in the development of mutual respect and friendship between the people of Paraguay and the United States. OutreachPARAGUAY directors and staff work in collaboration with the Paraguayan Ministry of Health, local community members,

educators, and health care professionals to develop and implement meaningful and sustainable projects that focus mostly on education and health care.

During the summer of 2024, the directors of OutreachPARAGUAY, along with volunteers and colleagues in Paraguay, traveled to 15 schools (in San Joaquin, Caaguazú, and Yuty, Caazapá) advocating for early childhood literacy. Educators were provided with training and tools to promote literacy and schools were provided with books and didactic materials. Fun was had by all, particularly while incorporating song and storytelling into lessons on handwashing and dental hygiene.

Volunteers also distributed over 1 ton of donated items (soccer gear, gently used clothing, medical equipment, medications, etc.) to resource-poor communities.

York Catholic students have adopted the OutreachPARAGUAY cause and collect money each year to support the mission. And if you visit Paraguay, don't be surprised if you see a child wearing a York Catholic sports jersey from a few years back. Señor includes retired uniforms among his donations to the country. We congratulate Señor Sosa and thank him for his 20 years of service to York Catholic and we also thank him for being an outstanding example to our students in living a life of service.

DR. TIM KOCHER '10

Taking Care of Native Americans in Alaska

You must have an adventurous heart to live in Alaska all year round, with the long hours of cold and darkness the state has in the winter months. Dr. Tim Kocher '10 and his wife Allison, a schoolteacher, live in Anchorage, AK and when asked why they chose Alaska to live, he said they both love the outdoors, and knew of the wilderness beauty, the wildlife, 34,000 miles of coastline, and the Northern Lights. So, when it became an option for Tim, Allison agreed to go along when he started his career as a clinical psychiatrist there.

Tim is the son of Rosemary (Dowger) Kocher, a YC Math teacher for almost 30 years, and Fred Kocher, who is still a YC Athletic Events employee, as well as brother to Alan '08. After graduating from YC, Tim went to Lycoming College where he got a BS in Chemistry. He graduated in 2014 and decided he wanted to do clinical work rather than research, so he went onto Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine. While there, he was president of the Internal Medicine Club and an anatomy teaching assistant. He graduated in the top quarter of his class in 2018. He went onto residency in adult psychiatry at The Ohio State University, graduated in 2022, then completed fellowship training in Behavioral Neurology and Neuropsychiatry at Ohio's State Dept of Neurology. Since then, his focus has been on dementia care and cognitive impairment.





His favorite part about living in Alaska since 2022 is the slower lifestyle and the many outdoor activities; even in the dark winter months people ride snowmobiles, and he personally has taken up hiking and cross-country snow skiing. His parents came to visit him because the state and national parks are so awesome and there are many different landscapes. The southern part of the state near Juneau is like a rainforest, the south-central section has endless mountains, and the western part has coastal fishing villages known for an abundance of salmon and halibut.

Alaska Native people belong to different tribes, each with different cultures, language, and traditions. They are geographically focused, so hunting and berry picking are very common ways of sustenance. People consider Anchorage a "big city," but it only has about 300,000 people spread over land the size of Delaware. We are used to options for the best healthcare in the United States, but the Alaskan Natives are grateful for any healthcare they can receive because they don't get very much. Native families are very large, and many generations live together. Elders are also very well respected for their wisdom and knowledge. Tim isn't sure what the future will hold for his family in Alaska – just enjoying this spectacular wonderland and knowing he is making a difference in his new community is fine for now!

Exploring a Career of Service

As an essential part of its mission, York Catholic Middle and High School aims to prepare students for service to a global community. While most teens walking our hallways are not yet traversing the globe, one need not look far to witness YC students contributing to the greater York community. Look to the west, and you might spot Michael Stein '28 serving with the West Manchester Township Fire Department.

Inspired by family memories of his paternal grandfather—a one-time York City firefighter—Michael wanted to become part of a rescue crew even as a young child. More recently, with his parents' cautious support, Michael did not think twice about accepting his step-father's invitation to become a junior firefighter. Ever since, he has been assisting what he appreciatively describes as a "family-like brotherhood" of volunteer firefighters as they respond to local medical calls, automobile accidents, and fire calls.

While Michael enjoys the adrenaline rush of emergency calls, the trust of adult firefighters who know they can count on him, and the friendly brotherhood of those Michael knows will be "there for anything you'd ever need," he says he serves his community because "it feels good to help people." Michael is keenly aware that on some of those calls he and his fellow firefighters step dutifully into the lives of people coping with their very worst day.

Whether he is assisting with CPR in the midst of a cardiac arrest, pulling equipment from a firetruck, helping to lift a gurney into the back of an ambulance, or politely coaxing an uninvited chipmunk out of someone's living room, Michael believes—whatever discomfort or danger he may face—it is more important to deliver relief, save a day, or work to lend an individual and a family time they might not otherwise have had.

Michael treasures the way being a junior firefighter helps him learn to think on his feet, achieve at school, and, beyond holding himself to a higher standard of character, believe he can always be an even better person.

So, does that make a young man feel like making a career of firefighting? Maybe, but, wise beyond his 15 years, Michael Stein is open to change, and he knows he probably ought to have a second plan, just in case. He says he'll probably go to college, where he hopes to wear a football uniform more often than his fire gear, and for now, when he's not working his way through ninth grade, maybe you'll spot Michael near a West Manchester fire truck, helping, because he can, and that makes him so very certain he should.

National Merit Scholars

Kathy Hand, Principal

The National Merit Scholarship Program supports and awards top scholars from across the country based upon qualifying scores on the PSAT. The PSAT is a test that is taken in preparation for the SAT, and most students take it junior year. The National Merit Scholarship Corporation pulls the top scores annually, and awards levels of recognition. A **Commended Scholar** is a top performer who receives recognition but does not progress in the competition. Semifinalists do progress forward, and complete an application to be considered for the title of National Merit Scholar. **Semifinalists** represent less than one percent of seniors in the United States. (The number of semifinalists in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of graduating seniors.) York Catholic has one of each in the graduating class of 2025, one Commended Scholar and one Semifinalist, both of whom represent the best of the best among their peers.

STUDENT ACHIEVEMENTS

Advanced Placement Students

The scores of the national Advanced Placement (AP) exams for high school students are in and YC students have again excelled.

Advanced Placement (AP) courses offer high school students college level rigor with AP students dedicating long hours of study that begin during the summer months and end in May with a national exam. AP courses are offered through College Board and graded on a scale of 1-5 with one the lowest grade possible and five the highest grade possible. Many colleges and universities accept a score of three or higher for college credit, a motivating factor for the students enrolled.

York Catholic Advanced Placement students took a total of 64 AP exams last May in the following subjects: English Literature, U.S. Government and Politics, U.S. History, Calculus AB and BC, Chemistry, and 2D Art and Design, achieving a 94% pass rate of a 3 or higher. Of the students who took the exams. 38% scored a 5 and 36% scored a 4.
