Dear YC Family,

The month of June is filled with mixed emotions as it is a time of farewell and reflection simultaneous with a time of restoration and renewal. Over the last two months, we have mourned the loss of our beloved Holy Father, Pope Francis, bid farewell to the Class of 2025 as they move forward well prepared for the next chapter lives, and successfully closed another school year. We now use the next couple of months for restoration, as we prepare for the renewal of the next school year.

In May 2014 when addressing an Italian school community, Pope Francis stated, "The mission of schools is to develop a sense of truth, of what is good and beautiful. And this occurs through a rich path made up of many ingredients." The lessons learned in all of our academic classrooms really lead to the simple truth that all of God's creation is "good and beautiful" and we are confident the Class of 2025 will take those lessons with them as they go on to serve the global community.

When reflecting on the previous academic year, I am most proud of the continued real-world experiences lived by our students on campus and beyond. From Palm Sunday Mass in Berlin to the hallowed grounds of Dachau, Germany, our students proved their commitment to lifelong learning during their 9-day adventure across Germany and the Czech Republic. Megan Wertz, our Social Studies Department Chair and Germany trip chaperone said:

"...my favorite part was watching our students make connections to so many things that we already talked about in class. I was beaming with pride while I listened to them answer questions asked by the tour guides. They would get excited to see the places and artifacts that I showed them pictures of in class, and then look back at me and smile. This really was a life changing experience. Certainly, the highlight of my teaching career!"

From service retreats in Lancaster, to field trips to Gettysburg and the National Shrine, to state-wide competitions in Hershey and Pittsburgh, the list of opportunities for a YC student to realize what they are learning and apply it to a real-world experience goes on and on. I could not be more grateful to the dedicated administration, faculty, and staff who make all of this possible every day for our young people.

And so now, we reflect and prepare for a renewed school year in a couple of short months where we will add new "ingredients" to the list of opportunities for a YC student.

I cannot thank all of you enough for your support of yet another successful school year. Enjoy reading all about it in the pages ahead and have a peaceful and restful summer.



# **Bankos Ends Storied Coaching Career**



After 19 highly successful years as the Head Coach of the Girls' Basketball program at York Catholic, Kevin Bankos '82 is retiring from coaching.

Bankos started his coaching career in the Catholic Youth Organization (CYO) as an assistant at St. Joseph York in 1982. He joined the York Catholic team as a JV coach in 2004 and was named Varsity head coach in 2006. During his tenure, Bankos amassed a record of 434-120 for a 78.3 winning percentage. He guided his teams to six state championship appearances, winning two titles. His teams won eleven District championships with 9 of them being in consecutive years, and 5 District silver medals. Bankos was named Pennsylvania Coach of the Year three times and YAIAA County Coach of the Year seven times during his career and is well respected within the coaching and basketball community. He was named to the York Catholic Hall of Fame in 2012.

Bankos will continue his position as Director of Operations at York Catholic, and will continue to oversee the athletic program headed by athletic director, Brad Hayek.

Ashton (Bankos) Hirsch '08, an assistant to Bankos and his daughter, will assume the helm as Head Coach. Hirsch was a member of York Catholic's 2006, 2007, and 2008 State Championship teams and is a member of York Catholic's Hall of Fame. She played basketball at Juniata College where she was named conference Player of the Year, Division III All American, and is a member of the Juniata College Hall of Fame. She also served as an assistant coach under Sherri Gorman at Elizabethtown College before moving to York Catholic as an assistant to Bankos.



Math teacher Bob Graf retires this year after a career devoted to education. Bob grew up in New York, graduating from Manhattan College in the Bronx, later earning his master's degree from Temple University in Philadelphia. Bob has dedicated 32 years to teaching mathematics; he has been a positive presence at York Catholic since 2017. He began his teaching career at William Penn High School in York, in 1992. He spent time teaching at Dallastown Area High School, and at St. Theresa School in New Cumberland. He served as Principal of Good Shepherd School for three years before returning to the classroom in 2014. Bob has taught middle and high school math, teaching everything from Pre-Algebra to Trigonometry. Bob is dedicated, genuine, and his positive outlook has tremendous impact on all those fortunate enough to know him.

Bob is a creature of habit, and we know his routine. He is typically the first to arrive daily, and by early, we mean 6:15 am. As he walks to his room, he opens classroom doors for colleagues, ensuring that they begin the day without a coffee splatter and the daily fumble for keys. Bob is in the halls as students enter the building, talking and laughing and reminding all that "It's a good day." That is his motto, his daily creed, and it keeps everyone in his radius smiling. If Bob Graf has had a bad day, we would never know. Upperclassmen know and will always remember his "ONE MINUTE!" warning that resonates down the one hundred level hallway at 8:14 every morning. It is a beloved ritual that let's the juniors and seniors know homeroom is about to start and they need to be in their seats.



Mr. Graf makes everyone, students and teachers alike, feel like they really matter. He goes above and beyond daily, and to walk past room 110 before or after school you will often see him working one-on-one with a student, coaching them on the principles of Geometry. He goes one classroom to the next before and after school, checking in on colleagues. Bob doesn't have favorites; he wanders in and chats up whomever he finds. This same level of attention is extended to the whole student body as well. Mr. Graf always asks students how their games went, or offers congratulations on recent achievements. He is often in attendance at many of the less frequented sporting events. It's normal to see faculty at high profile varsity football and basketball games. Mr. Graf, however, might be found walking around the two-mile mark of a high school cross country course, or sitting in a near-empty section of bleachers during a ninth grade basketball game. Bob is a genuinely good teacher, colleague, and friend, and we consider ourselves blessed to know and work with him.

When Adam Bittner '17 was a student at York Catholic, he was familiar with York Catholic's mission that states in part that the school prepares students to serve the global community. He took it to heart and travels the world learning, exploring, and making a difference wherever he goes.

The son of Brent Bittner and Liz Bittner Bury, and the brother to Megan '14 and Katherine '12. When Adam was a freshman at college, his father Brent passed away. Rather than let this moment define him, he decided to be deliberate in shaping an adventurous and fulfilling life. Adam said, "early on I realized that the most important times are now, and that my life was one worth celebrating. I think that knowing and understanding [myself] is the greatest gift that I can give. I'm always changing and adapting, [and] I hope that by living in this way, I can positively impact others."

Working summers and weekends as a farmhand in Dallastown, he became enthralled with studying different types of agricultural systems and eventually arrived at lowa State University. However, the drudgery of high-level calculus, economics and the pandemic did not provide the nourishing learning opportunity he was hoping to experience. For that reason, he took a gap semester working on a ranch in Neuquen, Argentina and pursued a language degree in Spanish and a minor in US Latino Studies with a focus on regenerative agricultural systems. Adam spent the last semester of his senior year outside of the United States studying literature, art, and working at a Slow Food farm at The University of Extremadura in Cáceres, Spain. Long story short, he loved it. Through moving, the expansiveness of his world continued to grow, and he chose not to return for his graduation ceremony. He believes this is an example of his orientation and perspective—always forward.

During and after college, Adam coordinated scholarships and exchange opportunities between youth in agriculture and the

United Nations, the Food and Agriculture Organization, and related NGOs with the International Association of Students of Agriculture and Science. Adam got to work on projects which included biodegradable plastics made out of milk in Ecuador, organic indigenous coffee cooperatives in Guatemala, and farming initiatives in Nepal, where the lack of flat arable land presents unique challenges. Work took on a new meaning, and it fueled and inspired him.

Later, Adam worked remotely from Big Sky, Montana; Berkeley, California; and Berlin, Germany. He focused on moving to Japan, and he enrolled in classes at his local community college. Finally, in August of 2024, he moved to the other side of the globe with the Japan Exchange and Teaching Program (JET). This program allows unique cultural exchange opportunities for Americans to work in schools and government offices in Japan.

Again, through combining his diverse interests and experiences, Adam moved to Tokyo and took a job on the Product Team with Eighty Days Japan, a sustainable tourism company specializing in bolstering rural economies and rejuvenating local communities that are facing challenges due to Japan's declining population.

Tokyo provides a dynamic, fast paced, and perfect environment for a person to challenge and reinvent themselves as Adam has done so many times in his young life. His visits to more than 20 countries make him prepared for this moment and for whatever comes next.

In the future, he plans to create his own company representing agricultural products abroad. With his vast and varied knowledge, his exciting sense of adventure, and his knack for thriving in a worldwide landscape, Adam will be a success wherever he plants his roots.

To preface this trip, let me begin by thanking our school for such a wonderful opportunity and my parents for supporting my travels. This fantastic experience wouldn't have been possible without them. Our York Catholic trip to Europe was my first time across the sea, made even more magical by Frau Richards's expert planning, in partnership with our travel company, ACIS. We were blessed with a fantastic tour guide, James, who took us all around Germany and Prague, specifically tailoring our journey to our preferences. We were able to visit St. Hedwig's Cathedral in Berlin on Palm Sunday and celebrate Mass there, as well as viewing many churches such as the St. Vitus Cathedral in Prague, or the Frauenkirche Church in Dresden.

In between these beautifully constructed churches, we spent time in Berlin, Dresden, Prague, Nuremberg, Munich, and Oberammergau. Some highlights from a few of these cities include working together in small teams to make our own street art in Berlin, visiting the reconstructed Semperoper opera house in Dresden, watching the Prague Astronomical Clock's famous performance, and taking a moment at the old Nazi Party Rally Grounds in Nuremberg. Of course, I would be remiss to not mention the Dachau concentration camp and the hike to Neuschwanstein Castle.

All throughout each day, we learned all about German and Czech history, but it came to a head at Dachau. Being able to walk on the same ground as the victims from nearly a century ago was both humbling and bone-chilling. It was an opportunity to pray for peace and for the repose of the souls long lost. There was even a small chapel on the grounds for prayer and offering candles. I am very grateful that we were able to visit and learn hands-on about the Holocaust because it brought me a new, even more reverent perspective on history.

Our spirits were lifted the next (and final) day by taking a ride out to the stunning Neuschwanstein Castle. I took the challenge, and was well rewarded with fantastic photos! The castle itself was also lovely, as we were given an in-depth tour of the meticulously crafted architecture inside. It was the perfect way to end our visit to Europe.

The senior class of 2025 has been situated inside the halls of YC for most of its time together, but two of the class members took a road less traveled...and flew east. Sara Czyzykowski spent the 2023-24 school year abroad in Paris, France, and Gianna Bird spent the first semester of her senior year in Neuss, Germany.

As a student with dual citizenship in both Poland and the USA, Sara is not unfamiliar with overseas travel. She returns to Poland each year to visit her family. As a sophomore, she started researching foreign exchange programs, wanting a new experience and to expose herself to a different culture.

Gianna's travel was her first overseas, but she is not unfamiliar with German culture. Her great-grandmother was an immigrant and her mother grew up immersed in the culture. Gianna taught herself German, and while she struggled to speak fluently initially, her ear for the language made her adjustment much easier.

Schooling was a huge part of the day for both girls. While Sara's days were much longer, as they started at 8 am and ended at 6 pm, Gianna's days were much like our traditional schooling here. For both, school was structured like college in that classes were lecture-style and student success was the responsibility of the student, something Sara and Gianna preferred. Their schedules varied, depending on their professors. High school in France and Germany prepares students for more specific career choices versus the general education it provides here in the States, and an academically focused education is not required after 8th grade.

While there, Sara played tennis and Gianna swam. Unlike here where sports teams are affiliated with school attendance, both girls joined clubs to participate in sports, something most students in their schools did.

Sara also traveled extensively by train. She visited Geneva, the French Alps, and the Mediterranean Coast. Her favorite place to frequent was the Café de Flore in the Quartior Latin.

Gianna also traveled with other exchange students who were also part of her program. Her favorite place was Oberwel, a small town in the Rhinelands where the beautiful countryside was replete with mountains, castles, and vineyards.

She was able to figure out what matters most to her, to see that there are options in life aside of the straight and narrow path she had already mapped for herself. Perhaps the thing she most valued was that her decisions there were not based on societal expectations, but what was right for her in the space and time.

Gianna also learned the value of independence, and found the cultural diversity a welcome change from her life here in York. Neuss is a hub for immigrants, and she enjoyed meeting people from all over the world, including Syria and Egypt. While both girls were more than happy to come home to friends and family at the end of their travels, they agree that it was the experience of a lifetime.

# **Student Civil War Reenactor**

Nola Webb '29 spends her summer break from school in a unique way. She goes back in time! She's a Civil War Reenactor who has combined her interest in history and her zeal for fashion into a way to enjoy her favorites all suammer long. Middle School English Teacher Rachel Shanko interviewed Nola to find out more about her experiences.

### What inspired you to get involved in Civil War reenactments?

I really like the Civil War in general and I also love the fashion of the time period. I think it is some of the best of the entire century. I wanted some of those dresses and know how to sew and while I started out making dresses for dolls, I eventually went on to make some for myself.

### How did you first hear about reenacting, and what drew you to this particular event?

When you look up how to sew stuff it just shows up. I started doing it with Hanover Junction at first because I thought it would be something fun to do.

### Can you describe the preparation process for the reenactment? What kind of research did you do?

There really isn't a process because I am not doing battlefield reenactments yet. The things I do are in a museum and I act as a docent who tells people about the Civil War. While I am there, I am wearing a ladies' work dress that is roughly from 1863.

### What are some of your favorite historical facts about the Civil War?

The first one is probably that the Battle of Gettysburg was fought because of Ulysses S. Grant. Grant was threatening Vicksburg Mississippi, a key Confederate stronghold on the Mississippi River. In the confederate capital of Richmond, a war council met and James Longstreet (Grant's close personal friend) favored directly attacking Grant at Vicksburg to stop the Union army from capturing the Mississippi River. However, Robert E. Lee decided to invade Pennsylvania in order to capture Harrisburg and draw Grant away from Vicksburg, but it didn't work. I also liked learning that George Washington was claimed by both sides to be the founder of their country.

### If you could time travel to any point during the Civil War, when would it be and why?

I would probably want to see the Battle of Antietam because it's kind of forgotten, but arguably the most impactful battle of the war and is the bloodiest day in American history. There were 22,000 casualties.

# Why do you think it's important to reenact historical events like the Civil War?

I believe it is important to reenact events like the Civil War so people can have a better understanding of the sheer magnitude of the size of the event. However, it is impossible to replicate the numbers in any of the battles. Even so, the numbers participating in the reenactments can still feel overwhelming. These conflicts were so large and cost so many lives, it is important they are not forgotten or misinterpreted.

I honestly just love the hoop skirts because they are so fun to wear. They make every outfit amazing.




